

City University of Hong Kong co-organises Global Conference Leadership Camp to cultivate future leaders

City University of Hong Kong (CityUHK), celebrating its 30th anniversary as a university this year, is committed to providing inspirational, interactive and innovative learning. As one of the most international universities in the world, CityUHK actively nurtures tomorrow's leaders with a global perspective.

CityUHK and See Change Education will co-host the Global Conference Leadership Camp in August, during which students will get to experience university life and visit CityUHK's advanced State Key Laboratory of Terahertz and Millimeter Waves and the CityUHK Veterinary Medical Centre in Sham Shui Po.

The students will also participate in the See Change Model United Nations (SCMUN) conference, where they will role-play as United Nations delegates to deliberate on global issues. Those who perform well at the SCMUN conference will be nominated to attend MUN conferences at Oxford or Cambridge University, or an Ivy League university in the United States.

Professor Chan Chi-hou, Vice-President (Community Engagement) at CityUHK, said, "CityUHK is dedicated to strengthening the connections between the University and the community, with the goal of bringing

positive change to society." There will be 10 full scholarships to help promising students participate.

Ms Rita Pang Yat-sum, founder of See Change Education and the Hong Kong Innovative Education Association, said, "We are extremely grateful for CityUHK's support for this event, allowing the participants to receive data, communication and MUN literacy training, powered by Future Language Academy, and immerse themselves in transformative learning experiences at the most international university in the world."

Three secondary school students who participated in previous SCMUNs said the experience helped broaden their horizons and boost their confidence, enabling an immense personal transformation.

Jophy Lew, from ELCHK Lutheran Academy, discussed the complexities of drug trafficking in an MUN at Yale University. She now participates in a drug-prevention programme, where she can apply what she learned.

Haleema Sadia Siraj, from Islamic Kasim Tuet Memorial College, said the MUN at Cambridge University sparked her passion for research, leading her to consider enrolling in CityUHK's International Relations and Global Affairs programme.

Leo Ng Cheuk-Wun, from Shun Lee Catholic Secondary School, said that as a student from a traditional school, his confidence was boosted after the SCMUN, and he is now the head prefect at his school.
